The First Lesson (Genesis 3:8-15, 17-19)

God has formed the first human from the dust of the ground and has breathed life into them. God then places them in a garden they are to care for. They are commanded not to eat the fruit of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. They disobey God, and the result is that the ground is cursed, and the humans are banished from the garden.

The Second Lesson

(Isaiah 9:2, 6-7)

The prophet, Isaiah, speaks to the people of Israel, who are suffering during a time of war, with a message of God's light shining in the midst of darkness and despair, a promise that is present in the here and now, not in a future time. He speaks of the birth of a child who will establish peace and justice on the earth.

The Third Lesson

(Jeremiah 31:31-34)

Jeremiah was a prophet in Israel at the time of the destruction of Jerusalem and the exile of the people. It happened because they were unfaithful to God, but here God shows that He has not given up on the people. God will make a new covenant with them, one written on their hearts.

Hymn CP140 It Came Upon the Midnight Clear (1,2,3,5)

It came upon the midnight clear, that glorious song of old, from angels bending near the earth to touch their harps of gold: "Peace on the earth, to all good will from heaven's most gracious king!" The world in solemn stillness lay to hear the angels sing.

Still through the cloven skies they come with peaceful wings unfurled, and still their heavenly music floats o'er all the weary world;

above its sad and lowly plains they bend on hovering wing, and ever o'er its Babel sounds the blessed angels sing.

Yet with the woes of sin and strife the world has suffered long; beneath the angel-strain have rolled two thousand years of wrong; and we amid our wars hear not the words of peace they bring; O listen now, and still your strife to hear the angels sing.

For Io, the days are hastening on, by prophets seen of old, when with the ever-circling years shall come the time foretold: when the new heaven and earth shall own the Prince of Peace their King, and the whole world send back the song which now the angels sing.

The Fourth Lesson

(Luke 1:26-38)

Zechariah has been told by an angel that his wife, Elizabeth, will bear a child in her old age. He will be named John. He will be filled with the Holy Spirit, and will "turn many of the people of Israel to the Lord their God ... to make ready a people prepared for the Lord." Now the angel has another announcement to make.

The Fifth Lesson

(Luke 1:39-45)

As the angel, Gabriel, foretold, Elizabeth is now six months pregnant with John the Baptist, and her relative Mary carries Jesus, foretold to be the Son of God, in her womb. God will make Jesus a king of David's line; he will rule Israel for ever.

Once in royal David's city stood a lowly cattle shed, where a mother laid her baby in a manger for his bed. Mary was that mother mild, Jesus Christ her little child.

He came down to earth from heaven who is God and Lord of all, and his shelter was a stable, and his cradle was a stall.

With the poor and mean and lowly lived on earth our Saviour holy.

Not in that poor lowly stable, with the oxen standing by, we shall see him, but in heaven, set at God's right hand on high, when, like stars, his children crowned all in white shall gather round.

The Sixth Lesson (Luke 2:1-20)

In our readings from the gospel of Luke, he wants us to know first, that Jesus was a real human being, born in a particular place at a particular time. He also wants us to understand that he has come forth from God as the prophets foretold. He is the holy child foretold, who will bring peace to all humankind.
